

Use of Technology in Pharmaceutical Business

Our Unit of Inquiry is about technology. On Monday, March 20, G5 students welcomed Mrs. Karina Hupało (Mikołaj, G5b, Marianna, K), who told us about the role of technology in pharmaceutical business.

Some years ago she worked at GlaxoSmithKline (GSK). The company's motto is to do more, feel better, live longer. In order to develop their products, they rely on advancing technology. GSK manufactures very important medicines, for example: Fenistil Gel, Voltaren, Avodart and many, many more. The medicine that they make help fight diseases such as epilepsy, depression, AIDS, migraine, etc. They also make softgel capsules - the little containers made from gelatine. To make softgels capsules they need soya oil, water and gelatine. It is very hard to make



softgel capsules because there are many complicated steps. Mrs. Hupało told us that on each capsule there used to be an ink mark. Later, the company invented a special machine that, instead of ink, uses laser to make these marks. Mrs. Hupało also explained how important it is to remember about safety rules when working with different chemicals. She showed us a special uniform that protects scientists from the high-potent substances, that can be very toxic. They need to wear a white outfit with a hood, double gloves and protective glasses.

I really enjoyed the time spent with Mrs. Hupało. We learned a lot about her work and the use of technology in making medicines.

Thirty percent of Poles declare that they can ski. Eleven percent ski at least once a year, which makes 4 million of active skiers. Comparing to previous years, this number increased due to current fashion concerning healthy lifestyle. Unfortunately, not all downhill descends end well.

During Winter 2015/2016 rescue was called 1 039 times on Polish slopes, where in 54% of the cases calls concerned a serious rescue action. The injuries, however, can be divided into those caused by skiers or snowboarders. As for skiing, most common injuries include bruises or fractures of shoulders, wrists, chests or knees. On the other hand, reckless snowboarding may result in broken ribs or kneecaps, but also concussions. In order to avoid previously mentioned injuries, we should watch out for any kind of collisions and other actions that may result in similar consequences. It is essential to respect few fundamental rules, which will allow you to enjoy your favorite winter sports and avert accidents.

First, it is important to remember that incorrectly adjusted ski bindings account for most of leg and knee injuries. To make sure your bindings are adjusted correctly, you should inform the technician responsible for your equipment about your age, weight and abilities.

Second, have in mind that snow and ice on slopes look significantly similar and it is really easy to skid. Experienced skiers may not have a problem with keeping their balance, but for others it may be difficult. That is why we need to be careful and cautiously observe the surface, on which we are skiing. However, in case you already entered an icy surface, the best advice is not to turn on the ice at all, but try to get onto a powdered snow beyond.

Another important factor is the weather. Climate conditions on high altitudes may change much faster than at low ones. The situation can sometimes change radically within minutes. Thus, remember that several layers of clothing are better than just one. Always wear gloves and warm socks in case the temperature drops. Also, in case mist appears, don't forget about goggles.

It is crucial to have in mind that off-piste skiing is extremely dangerous and you should avoid it at all times. One of the threats include avalanches. Most of the people are not aware of the possible danger or disregard it. Yet, mountains are full of hidden dangers and must at all times be respected.
